### What are the issues in the ward?

- Cost of living crisis continues to have impact on people members work with
- Increase in people in crisis in some services.

### What are the key issues facing members?

- Increasing cost of running services
- The uncertainty of funding for services. Constant renewal/tendering for service costs whilst there is an increase demand for services.

### General Member Update

- Marie Trust is seeing on average 100 people per day for crisis intervention, café, and counselling services.
- Their waiting list for counselling is currently 4 weeks. [info@themarietrust.org.uk](mailto:info@themarietrust.org.uk) for info
- 14 courses running in the Education service, in addition to their digital literacy program.
- The Marie Trust is pioneering a new project in partnership with Citizen Literacy to teach digital literacy skills through a digital app and one-to-one support to help people overcome digital barriers. They are looking for volunteers with an interest in learning support and this service can still accept referrals. [RHolmes@themarietrust.org.uk](mailto:RHolmes@themarietrust.org.uk) for info

#### Healing for the Heart <https://healingfortheheart.co.uk/>

- Key issues are that they are seeing an increased demand for all counselling and psychotherapy services but a decrease in funding available.
- Therefore facing the possibility of having to cut services in response to lack of funding.
- **Healing for the Heart have decided to:**
- To change their pricing structure for counselling and psychotherapy – meaning they are only able to offer a very limited number of free sessions, and this is dependent on funding.
- And they are actively engaging in marketing our products for sale (which we would formerly have tried to offer at low or no cost) and increasing their push for new business partners where they can provide mental health support for employees.
- Developed multiple delivery methods for new resiliency training which helps people to self-manage their own conditions.
- Hoping to move building in the next month, to a space on Argyle Street. This will further their working partnership with the Clutha Trust in sharing space.

#### Glasgow Council on Alcohol <https://www.glasgowcouncilonalcohol.org/>

- Synthetic Opioids appearing in Scotland's drug supply is an issue. Synthetic opioids called nitazenes have been linked to nine deaths in Scotland in the last six months. Staff have attended training on the new synthetic opioids, including [Scottish Drugs Forum Webinar](#). And staff & volunteers trained on use of and issued with Naloxone.
- Loss of service funding. – New Development Officer recruited to look at funding
- Cost of energy & office running costs. – looking at ways to save running costs with support from Green Business Support Programme & Business Energy Scotland



- Recent showcase event attended by over 60 partners, participants and interested parties, including the new Minister for Drugs and Alcohol Policy, Christine McKelvie.
- GCA's new LGBTQI+ service, Kinder Stronger Better, (KSB) launch event attended well. Service now open for participants and peer volunteers.

- **National Spring Clean and Litter Prevention** - GET is taking part in the national spring clean and is running the #YorkhillToYokerChallenge coordinating and promoting organisations doing clean ups in the local area. <https://www.glasgowecotrust.org.uk/News/spring-clean-yorkhill-to-yoker-challenge>. In addition we hosted a litter prevention meeting looking at facilitating a coordinated approach to litter prevention in the local area initially in partnership with Scotstoun CC and Whiteinch
- **Community Centre-d Climate Action** - working with 9 local community centres and hubs to develop a coordinated approach to community-led climate action. This work is funded through the new Glasgow Climate Action Hub
- **Better Buses for Strathclyde** - we have supported the petition and campaign calling for public control of the bus network. SPT will be consulting on proposed recommendations including franchising. This work contributes to our Active Travel and Sustainable Transport plan for Whiteinch and Scotstoun and links to the community led transport forum which is part funded by the AP.

- **Road Safety** - there is concern about not only the state of the roads, cycle paths and pavements but also there has been a spate of accidents and fatalities since late last year, many involving people walking and cycling.
- **Fundraising:** Glasgow Eco Trust staff and volunteers are taking part in the [Kilt Walk](#) again this year and our innovative flight donation scheme is gathering momentum (<https://www.glasgowecotrust.org.uk/Appeal/flight-donation-scheme> ). ### **Pathfinder – NW Employability Programme**

- Pathfinder is a unique, holistic employability support service offering young people aged 16-24 in NW Glasgow a proven successful route into real jobs and real opportunities. On Pathfinder, we find local businesses to support and mentor young people while on placement (which lasts up to 13 weeks). We establish links with placement providers who offer a route into FT employment or a Modern Apprenticeship when each placement is completed. Young people earn up to £100 p/w on placement (plus travel costs) and access essential training, accreditation & support. - Our team of youth workers are out on the street working together with young people where they often choose to socialise. We continue to target individuals and groups who are associated with anti-social behaviour in the local area. During our chats and catch ups, a core group expressed a keen interest in music creation and dj-ing. We've followed up on this by inviting young people to participate in an introductory music making course using Abelton software. This has had a massive positive response. We're now seeing young folk who often get caught up in trouble spending their time in our recording studio, working on new sounds and beats. There is great talent there and we are excited by the potential of what they're creating.

### What are the key issues facing members?

- Budget Cuts
- Rising Costs

### General Member Update

- Glasgow Health and Social Care has announced budget cuts of £25million and 150 jobs in Care and Health service will be lost. **This in a sector that is already stretched to capacity. This is worrying as it will fall to the Third Sector to fill the gaps.**
- The rise in wage rates for apprentices, although a good thing, **for many organisations will be unsustainable and some programmes may be cut.** This will lead to lost opportunities for school leavers and young people. It must be noted that The City Council will be less affected as they have been made exempt from the rise.
- Cuts in education will lead to the loss of 450 teaching jobs and will impact most on the poorest children and those with special needs. **This could widen the Equalities Gaps in the most deprived areas.**
- **Parking and travel in the ward:**
- The impact of some measures has already had wider consequences than probably originally envisaged. The vast increases in parking charges extending throughout the West End and to a large part of the South side has triggered warnings from hospitality industry organizations of severe risks of big closures of restaurants and cafes due to the drop in footfall and subsequent loss of income. It also could have an impact on recruitment and retention of staff and the lack of safety for women employees. **One question should be raised and that is whether an Impact Survey was undertaken before the proposals were put forward. The Voluntary Sector again faces serious problems.** Inner city organizations like CCH have very little parking space and often have employees working late in the evenings. CCH has women caretakers. It already has affected our functions.
- Many people live in areas where buses stop at 6pm. I have been informed already of community organizations in such areas planning to close - even the local Bridge Club will be closing due to lack of transport. The City Council promised Voluntary Sector organizations would receive scratch cards to give six hours of parking for £2 which would be very useful for people attending conferences and events. Being unable to park free of charge in the evenings would increase our residents' isolation. Carers who are not City Council employees have to pay the full cost of parking. Befriending Projects will also be badly affected particularly in view of the high proportion of elderly people and single person households in the area.
- Woodside Halls has been busy since opening and has bookings for the use of the Hall through the year already, after a busy start to the year.
- The removal of funding for bus passes from holiday programmes has led to organisations having to budget for this meaning they either need to ask for more money or lose some capacity in their programme.

#### Anti-social behaviour

- **New early intervention youth club in Whiteinch Centre.**
- Our new youth space in The Whiteinch Centre is ready to go! Our first session (for 8-11 years) will take place on Thursday 28th March from 3.30-5PM. This club will focus on early intervention, providing young people with a positive alternative to any ongoing issues in the local area. During club time we deliver drop-in and structured sessions where young people can access a range of activities and support, including issue-based workshops, health & wellbeing focused activities and trips, weekly football and cycling sessions, gardening and food growing, and digital learning activities.
- **DRC Alternative Curriculum – School Groups** - We are providing ongoing support, group work and a range of activities for groups of young people who are disengaged from local schools. Our new space in The Whiteinch Centre has strengthened our ability to offer group sessions and any issue-based work.

- **Exploring what young people want from/ in Victoria Park**
- The Victoria Park Community Trust and DRC Youth Project have been collaborating on a project with the intention of making Victoria Park a place for young people between the ages of 12-16. The goal is to develop an understanding of what young people seek from the park, and practical ways to bring the young people's priorities to fruition. Through facilitated sessions, the young people will be empowered to learn about the park spaces that they may not pay much attention to otherwise, and how to analyse the feasibility of their ideas. By involving the young people during the consultation, we are incentivising them to have a stake in the project development which will aim to encourage more park involvement and care. Based on the outcomes of the sessions, we can then confidently move forward in the project with an informed decision on what to implement in the park with the £1500 in funding that we have received from the Community Projects Fund.
- **Your Voice – In partnership with members of the North-West Youth Network**
- The DRC hosted the latest Your Voice event in Yoker Community Campus on Thursday 29th March. Young people, youth organisations and local partners from throughout the North-West all contributed to make this a special evening. Over 100 young people attended the event which showcased so much of the positive work being undertaken in our communities.
